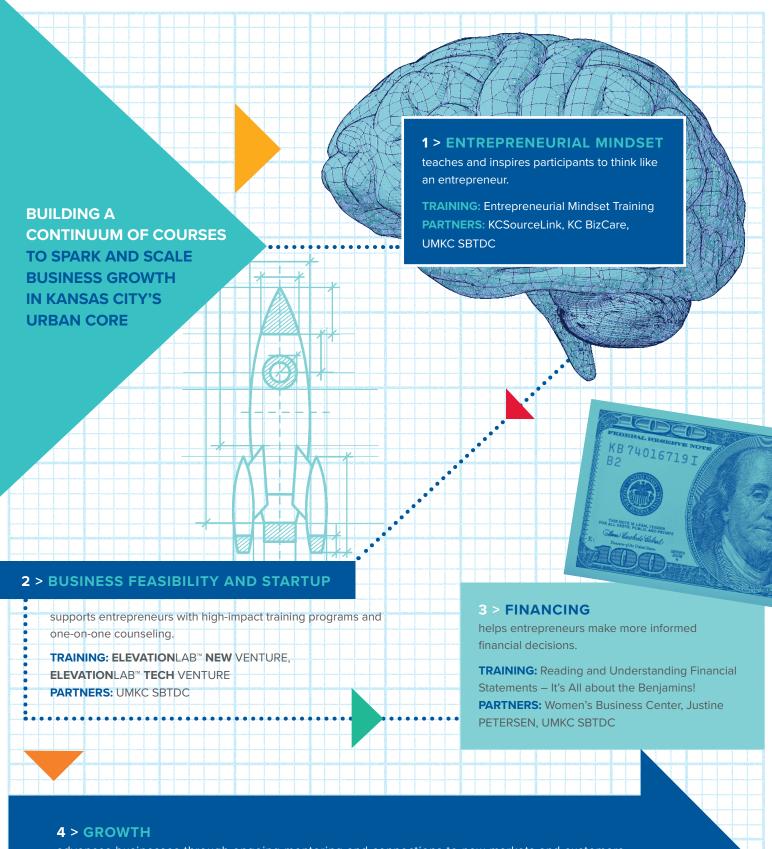

UBGI has delivered more than 450 scholarships for business training that have helped business owners in Kansas City's urban core found more than 60 businesses and create at least 350 jobs. That translates to a more than \$49 million increase in sales and over \$7.5 million in government contracts.

UBGI ensures successful outcomes by identifying, assessing and supporting an active pipeline of clients with diverse training opportunities and counseling. Through a strong partnership of entrepreneurial resources, UBGI provides a seamless process that is developing and strengthening business in the urban core of Kansas City, Missouri.

UBGI is a collaboration of KC BizCare (the Business Customer Service Center of the City of Kansas City, Missouri), the UMKC Small Business & Technology Development Center (UMKC SBTDC), the Missouri Procurement Technical Assistance Center (MO PTAC), Justine PETERSEN, the Women's Business Center and KCSourceLink. DONALD HAWKINS | CITYSMART



Kansas City entrepreneur Donald Hawkins knows about the power of community—and what can happen to community when businesses leave a city. So his latest app, CitySmart, aims to help small businesses crack into mobile marketing and showcase their services to new customers.

ELEVATIONLAB™ **TECH** VENTURE helped him clarify his value proposition, define who his customers were and tweak his business model.

HER BUSINESS IS A CANVAS

CRYSTAL PIHL | RADIANT CRYSTAL CREATIVE, SPARROW STUDIOS

A tough point in artist Crystal Pihl's life inspired her to shelve her day jobs, pick up her camera full time and heed the call of entrepreneurship.

"What you have to give is important, so if you want to start a business, that's what's going to impact people and make a difference," she says. "It has to."

She says she hadn't created her photography business sooner because she wasn't sure of the direction she wanted to take. Entrepreneurial Mindset Training helped her define that business concept and connected her with a support network of fellow entrepreneurs as well as a business coach who's given her advice and work opportunities.

As she channels her fine-art photography into a business, she's also thinking about how she could expand into interior design, selling products and other photo services.

Josh Lewis was a college student when he first got his idea for his entertainment app, UpDown NightLife. He took the **ELEVATION**LAB™ **TECH** VENTURE course, which he says showed him the importance of financials and how to produce revenue. The program also helped him launch his second venture, Proxxy Media.

WHAT I LEARNED: My coach taught me how to break down who my key customers and partners were, which helped me bring in almost three times more money each month. To grow my business, I learned it's important to have a full plan for every move I make.

Johanna Miller thought she wanted a brick-and-mortar business. But Entrepreneurial Mindset Training helped her clarify her goals and map a better plan for an online business. Now, she's growing her hand-dyed yarn venture, Potion Yarns.

WHAT I'VE ACCOMPLISHED SINCE UBGI: In a year's time, I've dramatically increased my inventory, started a weekly podcast on YouTube, grown my social media audience, continued to meet or exceed business goals for each quarter, increased profits by over 10 percent and traveled to out-of-state events and trade shows.

Years ago, Molly Bingaman left her job as a paralegal and started her own fashion consulting business out of her home. The **ELEVATION**LAB™ **NEW** VENTURE and Entrepreneurial Mindset Training courses helped prep her biz (and her brain) for her brick-and-mortar Ladybird Style Lab and Salon.

WHAT UBGI TAUGHT ME: I probably wouldn't have gone forward if I hadn't had the tools I got from **ELEVATION**LAB $^{\text{\tiny{M}}}$ courses. A NEW WINDOW OF OPPORTUNITY

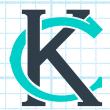
JORGE AGUILAR | EMPIRE CLEANING

WHAT I'M WORKING ON NOW: Since the program, I think more like a CEO and focus on financials and documentation. We have contracts in more than nine states, and our team travels across the country. We plan to increase our company size by half within the next year and 150 percent in the next three years.
